
MUSICAL NOTES


the energy with which all the children took part. Our Parent Choir, The Mamas and


Next term sees the start of 7's Rugby and the national qualifiers. I hope all of the players will retain their enthusiasm, which they showed in abundance this term.

Under 11 B Team


This has been an immensely enjoyable season for the B Team, which has been led very well by Jack Watt and Harvey Wilder and ably supported by all of the boys. Throughout the
