Popular children's author Jon Blake visited the school in September to talk about his love of books. Jon has written humorous and serious fiction for all ages, and has had more than fifty books published, including the Stinky Finger, Little Stupendo and Dogsbottom School series, The Supreme Dream Machine, The Last Free Cat, Mutiny on the School Ship Bounty and Oshie, his most recent book, which tells the story of an amazing boy with cerebral palsy. #### **Young Farmers**

At the beginning of November **Year 5** went to visit Halberton Court Farm as part of their geography work on farming. Mr. Stevens kindly showed us around his farm and told us about his work as a farmer. We rode on a huge trailer pulled by a tractor; it was rather bumpy but great fun!

This is what Jasper Pring wrote when he got back to school: "The climate in Devon is wet and mild so Mr. Stevens can grow a range of fruit and vegetables. He has polytunnels to protect his tomatoes and strawberries so they will not die from the cold and wet weather and they will ripen more easily in the warm conditions. Mr. Stevens also grows Tundra cabbages to survive the cold weather and frost. This means he can grow cabbages for longer in the year. The soil is a very good soil for growing crops, a mixture of clay and red sand that is called loam. He rotates his crops each year so that the soil can keep its nutrients and can produce good crops every year. In winter the

cabbages have fleece on them to keep the frost off." M.J.L.



#### **Victorian Christmas**

#### **Toddler Christmas Party**


