
The Blundell's Adventure, Leadership and Service Award, or 'BALSA' as it is more commonly known, has grown from strength to strength over the years, offering our Year 6 pupils a way of really enriching their lives in school and beyond. Students collect points by putting themselves forward for responsible positions in school, by showing leadership in challenging situations, through helping others and by pushing themselves to do things that they might not normally have done. Many of these points are gained in school through Prefect responsibilities, by showing leadership on the sports fields or when taking part in our numerous exciting trips and residentials.

Perhaps the most satisfying achievements, however, are the ones that take place at home, where teachers are not chasing them and where the children are able to really think about their own strengths and how they might be best used. It would be impossible to list all of the activities that have taken place this year, but it is fair to say that all of the pupils have been an absolute credit to their families and the school - cake sales, charity football matches, teddy bear sleepovers, treks on horses, sponsored silences and 'blind days', beach clean-ups, hikes across Dartmoor and along the coast, car washes, fun runs and talent shows have all raised huge amounts of money for charity and helped the children to grow as individuals. In fact the class of 2016 have incredibly raised just under £12,000 to date for twenty different charities - amazing!

Alongside this, and perhaps more impressively, the less 'glamorous' acts such as visits to residential homes, helping out around the house or in the garden, reading with younger pupils or assisting siblings with homework, and helping neighbours who struggle on their own have all proven to be hugely rewarding experiences for the students as they prepare themselves for the next stage in their education.

In June we were delighted to welcome Richard Salter, a young man from nearby Bolham, to our BALSA Celebration Evening. He spoke about the huge amounts of work that he has done to raise money for charity, whilst also talking about his experiences with St. John Ambulance, and how the skills and confidence that he has acquired have helped him to build a successful career in finance in London. The pupils, and parents, were captivated by his words as he talked about how the skills and experiences the children have gained throughout the BALSA scheme will help them in their future lives.

BALSA has certainly given the children a wonderful end to their time in Year 6, with all learning huge amounts about themselves and others, but for many of our pupils this is just the start – and we look forward to following the progress that these wonderful young individuals will make through further Adventure, Leadership and Service initiatives as they move into Year 7 and beyond. **DJM** 






#### **BLUNDELL'S GOT TALENT**


